Dear Members of the Sacramento Transit Authority Board:

I am a long-time resident of Midtown Sacramento and utilize bicycles as my primary means of transportation, along with public transit and a plug-in hybrid electric vehicle. The new Measure A Transportation Expenditure Plan (TEP) and accompanying ordinance are of critical importance for our county and region. Since this is a 40-year measure, it is critical to get it right and ensure that it is forward looking (more public transit and active transportation) and not backward-looking (continuing to over rely on individual, polluting autos).

I support the March 11 letter-of-comment submitted to you by the SMART/SacMoves coalition, and I appreciate the changes that you have made to the TEP in response to Mayor Darrell Steinberg's important letter of March 5. As you make your final modifications of the TEP and move toward its adoption, please consider the following:

- 1. Allocate enough money for safe, complete streets and sidewalks for cyclists and pedestrians. Construct these projects sooner than later.
- 2. Hold significant regional projects for roads and transit to the rigorous state and federal standards related to climate change. Reduce automobile trips, vehicle miles travelled, and greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. Enhanced public transit to replace autos is a critical component of achieving this aim.
- 3. Allocate any higher-than-expected sales tax revenue exclusively to provide additional bus and light rail transit service.

4. Meet or exceed the state's climate change standards when evaluating road expansion projects like the Southeast Connector.

Experts from the United Nations to the State of California tell us that we only have 10 years to make very substantial reductions in our GHG emissions, or we face very grim climate change outcomes on this planet. The current COVID-19 disruption is just a small taste of the global disasters that will unwind with a failure to drastically reduce GHG emissions. 



If this proposal was to fix our County roads entirely - I would be all for it, because our crumbling infrastructure needs to be repaired first and foremost. Watt Avenue is a crumbling mess, has been for decades, and it is just one of many examples through out the County. The total amount raised by this tax (8m plus over 40 years) will not fully fund the repairs that need to be done on County roads, but it would be a big move toward doing so. People want their roads repaired and are willing to pay for that, but not when one thing is promised, while another thing is done. The lack of public trust is a huge impediment to getting taxes passed.

Unfortunately, that is what is happening since the current proposal directs nearly 40% to public transit. While I certainly get climate warming and the need for greener solutions and all that, but (a) we have an infrastructure here that has not been maintained properly, gets used heavily despite public transit) and needs badly the money and attention, while (b) throwing good money after bad in a county public transit system that is not and cannot pay for itself, what with the "honor" payment system that does not work, and the past poor choices in implementation. I see a huge subsidy for the rail system that is really a drain now on all our pocket books, for very little return. I was a huge advocate of public transit, but the County, the Region and RT repeatedly squandered its opportunities to make it work.

Only 3 plus million over 40 years for road repair is not even a drop in the bucket. All 8 million should go to road repair, or at the very least 5 million. If you do not alter your percentages and try to cram this down the public's throat, you will loose the election.

We support the SMART/SacMoves coalition and their 50/50 alternative proposal and SMART principles.

We have watched various groups speak to the need for more funds for public transportation, safe routes to school, and fix it first for our streets, roads, and sidewalks. We have read the letters from the Mayor and the California Air Quality Board saying we need to change the carbon footprint in Sacramento. Dear Chair Suen,

I write to personally commend the STA Board of Directors and regional staff who have worked very hard to seek funding for a wide variety of transportation projects to benefit the entire greater Sacramento region.

As you know, improved road conditions and reduced traffic congestion rank high among the priorities identified by likely voters. Once completed, the Capital SouthEast Connector is predicted to reduce the region's congested Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) by 38 million miles a year, climinate 500,000 hours per year spent sitting in traffic, and save \$9 million annually in travel time costs and lost productivity.

The Connector could also facilitate transit service by providing a direct, limited access facility for bus rapid transit and links to two light rail extensions.

As your Board deliberates this Thursday, I would encourage you to consider the benefits of the Connector as a whole rather than isolating one segment of a 34-mile long expressway. The benefits of the entire Connector to the greater Sacramento region have long been recognized and incorporated into regional and local transportation planning efforts for many years. 

Greetings everyone,

As many of you know, the Sacramento Area Bicycle Advocates is a member of the SacMoves/SMART coalition, which has been pushing for changes in the draft TEP that embrace plans and processes for cleaner air and a lowering of GHG. We stand alongside Mayor Steinberg and CARB in their agreement that new highway projects must demonstrate that they would not exacerbate climate change, in order to be eligible for funding under the proposed new Sales Tax measure.

We also are, as you might have guessed, big fans of the Complete Streets section outlined in the TEP. That said, we do not believe that the ordinance language goes far enough by allowing jurisdictions to have separate plans collectively stand in for an overarching Complete Streets plan. Bike and ped master plans + ADA master plans do not add up to a Complete Streets plan. So, while many of the jurisdictions have lists of projects in them to be treated with a Complete Street focus, we believe that having a year to put a Complete Streets master plan and process in place is important to accurately make Complete Streets changes to any given project.

SABA urges you to require each jurisdiction to have a Complete Streets plan in place within one year from the allocation of the Sales Tax Measure. Only then, will city planners, and public works people be on the same page when it comes to expending funds for this important aspect of the future of our streets. Better streets make for better communities.

I am writing to advocate for the strongest possible allocation of funds for transit in the STA expenditure plan.

Specifically, I am in strong support of Mayor Steinburg's directive that all projects funded by the current proposal meet state and regional goals for greenhouse gas emission and VMT reduction targets.

I believe the current allocation of 60% for roads does not align with the regional vision for reducing VMT and GHG emissions. However, at a minimum, if the allocation of funds is set at this percentage, we must be extremely vigilant that those dollars are spent only on projects that further goals of accessibility and mobility while ALSO reducing emissions that negatively impact air quality in this valley.

I grew up in Carmichael and am particularly displeased with Supervisor Peter's backwards thinking on this topic - I am writing in response to her mass email just today which is clearly biased against transit and is fishing for constituents opposed to any tax increase. I cycled and drove Carmichael roads for decades - every resident in this suburb would love better access to transit, safer bike lines, and improved roads. What we do NOT want is more traffic and highways. The data and science is clear - if we build more highways, we will create more traffic in the long run. Conversely, if we invest in better public transit and safer means of getting around without a car, then traffic congestion is reduced.

I would gladly support a tax increase that achieves a vision of reducing greenhouse gas emissions and vehicle miles traveled. But I would not support a tax increase to build more roads that do not meet emissions reductions targets set by the state in the region.

Thank you for allowing me this opportunity to submit a public comment in favor of this transportation plan. Specifically, I would like to extend my support for the 60% allocated for road improvements, maintenance, and expansion.

I would like to share with you all two quick ways how this package would personally affect me and many other residents.

First, as a recent college graduate, I have to be hyper-aware of the roads I drive on in Sacramento and of any potholes, which there are many. Because if a pothole were to damage my car, I would lose a majority of my pay-check to fix it and I would have limited access getting to and from work. After two months of living here, I have found a route that has the least amount of potholes which also adds an extra 3 miles to my drive everyday.

Second, I have also realized how difficult it is to travel to other cities in the areas. It is unnecessarily difficult to visit family outside of Sacramento since all of the routes go through downtown. I have to plan days ahead before traveling to a city just because of the downtown traffic. A Connector would divert that traffic and make it much easier to see my family.

This also affects the way I plan for my future. If I were to stay in the area, I would have limited options as to where I could live and work. With traffic going through the core of Sacramento, I could not work in any other cities without spending hours sitting in traffic. And this issue goes beyond just the tedious and annoying feeling of sitting in traffic; we miss out on our lives. People have to make choices between either their family or their job and that is not a choice anyone should have to make.

This package gives priority to every resident. I don't want to have to worry about hardly being able to pay rent because my car was damaged by negligent road maintenance. Each jurisdiction in this county has one or more major Complete Streets projects completed and/or in process. For example: Antelope Road, Bruceville Road, East Bidwell Street, Carillion Boulevard, and Folsom Boulevard (in three jurisdiction). Everybody does Complete Streets for some capital projects, at least.

The Governor's Office of Planning and Research General Plan Guidelines states "OPR recommends that local jurisdictions view all transportation improvements, new or retrofit, as opportunities to improve safety, access, and mobility for all travelers and recognize bicycle, pedestrian, and transit modes as integral elements of their transportation system."

Equally important, it goes on to say "The standard practice should be to construct complete streets while prioritizing project selection and project funding so that jurisdictions accelerate development of a balanced, multimodal transportation network that allows residents to choose a variety of modes to reach daily destinations such as transit hubs, schools, job centers, and retail outlets." [emphasis added]

It's imperative that Complete Streets concepts are applied to the planning, design, construction and management of all projects. This doesn't mean that every project funded by STA must have equal pedestrian, bicycle and vehicle facilities — it means balancing the needs of all users whenever possible, not just when it's convenient to do so or when matching funding is available for a specific project.

When thinking about how your constituents view Complete Streets, consider that drivers view time and speed as priorities and safety is pretty much out of mind because the car interior is so safe. Pedestrians and bicyclists are more concerned with safety – being vulnerable users on the road, they're at the greatest risk. WALKSacramento has led walk audits in many places across the Sacramento region, and participants that don't walk or bike are frequently surprised the street environment on foot or bike is much worse than they thought.

We recommend that the Board revise the Complete Streets implementation language to make Bicycle/Pedestrian Master plans or similar documents supplements to Complete Streets rather than substitutes so that our residents and communities get the full benefits of safety, mobility and access as soon as possible.

To the Authority's credit, the proposed implementation guidelines place a premium on fiscal accountability, including annual audits. But principles of good government dictate we also be accountable for meeting environmental standards in State law, including those adopted as part of the Metropolitan Transportation Plan.

Ensuring that Sacramento County is doing its part to meet those requirements should also be part of the guidelines. I suggest you have a mechanism to do that, through the five-year plans submitted by the local agencies. After you compile those plans each year, you can work with SACOG to check their impact, to ensure that *together* we are becoming and staying consistent with the VMT and GHG reduction targets set for our region under Senate Bills 375 and 743.

Let's ensure that Measure A-funded projects achieve no-net increase in per capita VMT and a 19% per capita GHG reduction by 2035. Working with SACOG travel modelers each year let's assess whether local plans and associated land uses will, in the aggregate, achieve VMT and GHG targets. A process of regular regional assessment and continued give-and-take with local agencies is critical, because falling short of the targets will threaten both the health of our communities and the availability of State transportation funds.

In closing, I understand some of you view STA as a funding and programming agency, not a policy body. But we effectively re-make policy when we fund projects of regional significance that impede the achievement of already enacted policies. Let's ensure we don't do that by including a mechanism for greenhouse gas and VMT accountability in the implementation guidelines.

Will: Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the expenditure plan you have submitted to the STA board for consideration as a November, 2020 ballot measure. Below are my comments.

- 1. The Expenditure Plan as Proposed by STA Staff: I support all of the projects contained in the expenditure plan. That plan is the product of a lot of effort by STA board and staff members over an extended time. In my opinion, the plan should be supported by the political leaders in all of the communities comprising Sacramento County. Striking a balance between road construction and maintenance, and public transportation is key to our success. This plan does that. The alternative is more traffic congestion, poor public transit service, and more noise and air
- 2. <u>The Capital Southeast Connector (Expressway) Project</u>: Of particular importance for the cities of Folsom, Elk Grove, Rancho Cordova and Sacramento is this "Connector Project." First, some background.
 - a. <u>Background</u>: The Connector Project has been an active project since it was first promoted by the 50 Corridor TMA back around 1995. It gathered real momentum when it was supported by SACOG's Transportation Air Quality Collaborative some 15 or so years ago and with that support, it was included in the expenditure plan for the November, 2004 renewal of Measure "A." That renewal measure passed with large majorities in Folsom, Elk Grove, and Rancho Cordova which are the communities where this road project is located. There was no significant political opposition to the inclusion of the Connector Project in that Measure "A."
 - b. Status: The project is well underway with significant improvements completed at the Connector's intersection with Hwy 99, at a portion of the Connector right of way between Grant Line Road and Prairie City Road, and construction is about to begin on the stretch between Prairie City Road and the El Dorado County line. Unfortunately, the current Measure "A" does not have sufficient future revenues to complete the middle section of the Connector

- Project. Without the "new" proposed Measure "A" the Connector Project will be hard pressed to reach completion in the foreseeable future.
- Relief From Deleterious Impacts on Sacramento City Residents/Businesses: In 2019, Kimley-Horn & Associates, Inc. did a study for the Connector JPA on, among other things, the likely beneficial impacts of the Connector Project on the neighborhoods and businesses of the City of Sacramento which are located in close proximity to Hwy 99 Freeway (between Sheldon Road & Hwy 50), the Business 80 Freeway, the I-5 Freeway, south of Hwy 50, and the Hwy 50 Freeway from I-5 to Watt Avenue. What that study establishes is that the Connector (when completed from I-5 in south Sacramento County to Hwy 50 in El Dorado County) will eliminate between 400,00 and 700,000 vehicle trips per year on the freeways within Sacramento City councilmanic districts 3, 4, 5, 6, and 8. Interestingly, Mayor Steinberg's former District 6 residents [of which I was a resident from October, 1973 through June, 1980 and during the terms of Ritz Naygrow and Lloyd Connelly, respectively] would be the biggest beneficiary from the project. Some relief from traffic congestion noise and air pollution for those Sacramento residents should be yet another reason for all of the Sacramento Region's political leaders to support the timely funding and the completion of the Connector Project.
- d. Newer Technologies Need STA's Support: A host of new, clean technologies have been developed since the first Measure "A" in 1988. Electric vehicles, hybrid vehicles, autonomous vehicles, all of them are aimed at relieving traffic congestion, and noise and air pollution. They are also intended to supplanting gasoline and diesel powered motor vehicles with clean energy vehicles. They aren't aimed at replacing or supplanting public transit. None of those technologies can be successful if we don't maintain and improve our roadways and our roadway systems. This goal is at least equal in importance to maintaining and expanding public transit opportunities as well as bike and ped opportunities. Roadways should not be viewed as a sort of second class citizen. The 800,000 or so voters in Sacramento County certainly don't view it that way, if their driver's licenses and their vehicle registrations mean anything.

We are pleased that Measure A⁺'s draft expenditure plan (DEP) would provide a much greater percentage of funding for transit, compared to 2016's illfated Measure B.

However, the DEP would not provide as great a percentage for transit as the current Measure A. 
